As Wordsworth writes:

There is a blessing in the air, Which seems a sense of joy to yield.

Spring is upon us, the bulbs are shooting up, the snowdrops have been coping with wind, rain and snow, the daffodils are opening out and nodding their golden heads. It would be lovely to say that spring is definitely here except, that as I write, we have had rain, snow, sleet and sunshine! PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

GRAVEL EXTRACTION UPDATE - The Baston Parish Council submitted their formal response to the Lincolnshire County Council regarding the "call for sites" before the 6th of January deadline. A leaflet has since been circulated throughout the village by CEMEX and Thetford Farm Estate regarding their proposed gravel pit to the north and northeast of the village. No formal planning application has been made so far, this is a preliminary step before that happens. CEMEX had a public exhibition of their proposal at The Barn on Wednesday 22nd March from 3pm to 8pm. A decision on this proposal, when it is submitted, will affect the village regardless of the outcome, so we would encourage everyone who was unable to attend to view the proposal online at thetfordquarry.consultationonline.co.uk. A group of women dedicated to raising money for cancer research under the auspices of Cancer Research UK are relocating their base to the Black Horse in Baston and are looking to increase their membership. The meetings are held on the 4th Tuesday in the month and include a two course lunch, raffle and tea or coffee with a speaker afterwards for £20pp. Over many years they have raised over £1.2m for Cancer Research UK for life-saving research at the CRUK Cambridge Institute. Cancer survival in the UK has doubled since the early 1970s and Cancer Research UK's work has been at the heart of that progress. Past Times

Christian worship has been present in Baston for 1400 years. From about AD 650, the stone and rubble 'dwelling', grew into the magnificent Norman church in our village centre. Building this church began during the AD 900s, linked with Crowland Abbey. It was recorded in Domesday of AD 1086 (937 years ago). Our basic nave/two aisles/chancel/tower structure was enlarged across four centuries from AD 1150 to AD 1550 when the early tower was raised further, along with the clerestory 'spine' on top of the nave. Pews came in AD 1660 (365 years ago), also in AD 1850. These were removed in AD 2010 (submitting to hard chairs), when the floor of the nave was refurbished with Clipsham stone.

The AD 1450 porch and roof were renovated AD 2017. Destructive issues came from five localised wars of monarchs and parliament, the Reformation, plagues, neglect and weathering – and yet, carved stone arches, pillars, timber and lead survive from AD 1150, the Baston Chest from AD 1280, the church door, wooden roof tie-joists from at least AD 1660. Much is recorded about our church, its benefactors, feasts; owners/sellers (bought from the Crown for £45 in AD 1550). From AD 1693 for six bells, organ, clock, heating, flags, Bibles, robes, glazed and stained-glass windows, panelling, pulpits – even our vicars are named from AD 1200. 823 years ago! AD 2023 presents the coronation of Charles III in Westminster Abbey, our first of this third millennium and presented as one of many faiths and cultures.
