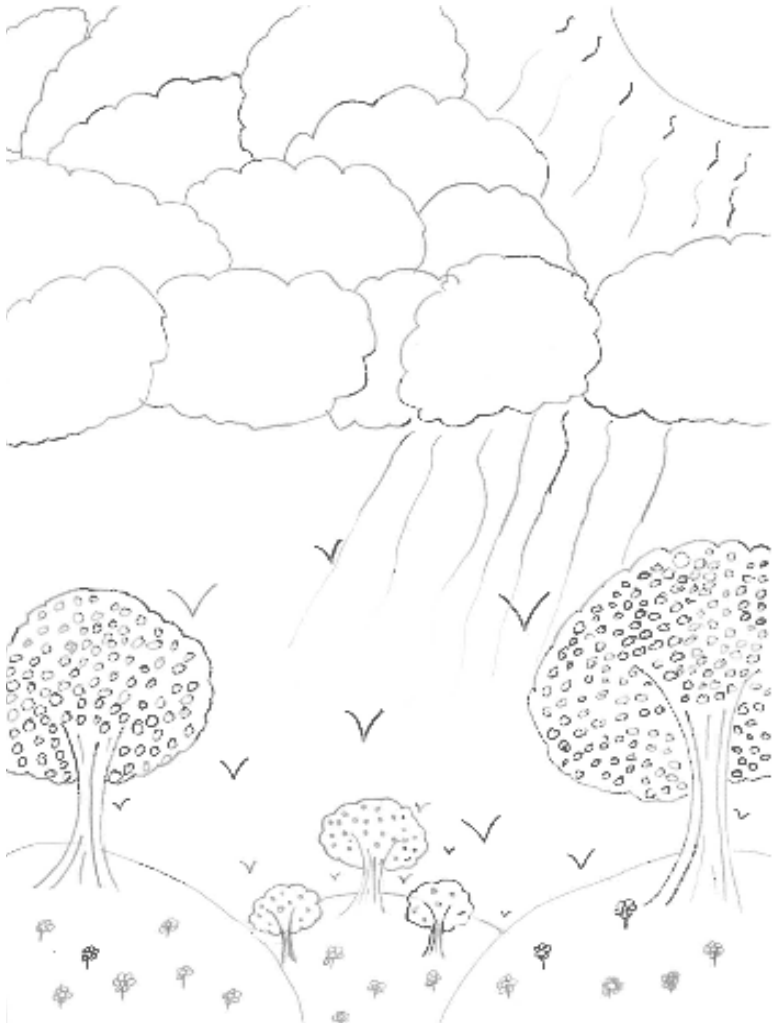

I have just attended the leavers' services for the schools. The young people have said goodbye to their first school with its familiarity and friendships. Friends may be going to different secondary schools, a huge change for them as making new friends can be daunting.

I am in awe of what these young people and their teachers have managed during this cohort's time in Key Stage One despite Government policy U-turns, constant pressure on targets and attainment often with less-than-ideal funding, not forgetting the pandemic which affected a huge percentage of their time. The teachers in our schools have continued to care and support our young people though it all. The children have grown up and have managed to achieve all they needed to.

These young people are seeing the changes in our climate, what happens when a new virus hits, what happens when war affects not only the countries involved but the global economy. They live in a world where communication is instant and constant. They will live with the changes

that AI will bring. These young people are the leaders of tomorrow. They can see what harm has been done. But I have hope. They are resilient, they value community, knowing the impact of isolation and distancing. They are passionate about caring for our environment, each other and the world.

God created us to be stewards of this world and gave us the commandment to love our neighbours as ourselves. History has shown we have failed miserably. I hope that, despite the pressures, our young people can learn to love themselves because they are precious children of God.

And if they remember that, they will be in a good place to love their neighbours and perhaps repair the damage we have inflicted on creation. If you are looking at these young people and thinking that's a bit of a tall order, remember that they are fearfully and wonderfully made. They are resilient and our hope for the future.

Improvements - Following recent successful bids for external funding based on suggestions received from the Village, a combined Parent & Toddler Swing Seat is to be installed and the old, but well-loved see-saw replaced with a new wooden see-saw. The old see-saw was beyond economical repair and its continued long-term safe use could not be assured.

Tennis - Tennis court hire remains available from the Village shop - £5 per court per hour. Family membership is available at £75 per year; details on how to apply are on the BPFMC website - www.bpfmc.org

Vandalism & Damage - Sadly, there have been more instances of vandalism and damage. While Committee members were clearing away broken glass, they noticed that

recent significant damage had been caused to the rebound wall rear panel, possibly by one of the goal posts removed from the pitch for the summer. We made a Crime Report to the Police and requested an increased Police presence in the Village. When examining the CCTV footage to determine if the perpetrators could be identified, it was noted that male adults and boys were urinating behind the Barn. The Police confirmed this is a Public Order Offence.

BASTON PARISH COUNCIL

On Monday 17th July Cllr Paul Delmer and Cllr Phil Redmore invited the LCC Highways team to Baston to walk the village and stress the importance of traffic calming, puffin crossings, 7.5T weight limits, and the safety of children and villagers in crossing Main St and the A15 at Maltby Drive. We will await their response in the coming months. A donation of a 36 place ipad charger has been made to the primary school for the Hive & Stem zone. There is no news on the Parish Council's application to the Prosperity Fund for a new notice board or cricket nets but the Parish Councillors are on the case with District Councillors to get this moving. Grass cutting, bins and Carl's excellent job of keeping the village tidy are all working well. *David Plant*

FROM OUR LOCAL COUNCILLORS

Dear Residents, As your local councillors we wish to keep you up-to-date on District and County Council news. South Kesteven District Council has a new Independent Leader following May's elections. SKDC is responsible for planning applications, planning enforcement and waste collection. Other services include housing, environmental health and licensing. The SKToday magazine is now online and contains a lot of useful information: www.southkesteven.gov.uk/sktoday. Lincolnshire County Council covers South Kesteven as well as the majority of Lincolnshire. LCC's responsibilities include highways, education, social care, waste disposal and mineral extraction. The next County elections will be in 2025, staggered with District elections every four years.

SKDC and LCC work together to improve waste management, being responsible for collection and disposal respectively. Consequently, later this year, households will receive a new wheelie bin for paper and card. We realise some people may struggle to find space for another bin, but separating out these materials will improve recycling rates and, in any case, this measure will soon be required by national legislation. HARVEST FESTIVAL AND AUCTION

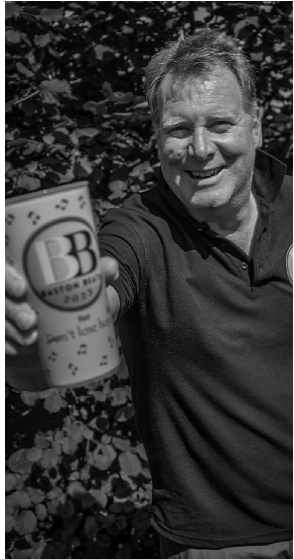

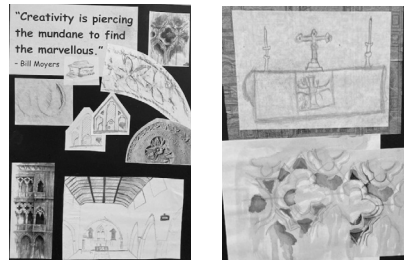

Bryony Griffith and Alice Jones 22nd June 2023 Baston tonight I was greeted by a rainbow over the village. A sign? Or perhaps just a joyous celebration of the end of another fabulous season a Baston Folk Club. Either way it was a colourful way to start off the last concert before the obligatory summer break. Bryony and Alice describe themselves as a 'Yorkshire Folk Music Duo' with clear emphasis on the Yorkshire. They would not have been out of place in the first series of the recent BBC 'The Gallows Pole', a series set in 1760s West Yorkshire. Nature Watch

There has been some interesting wildlife observed in the churchyard nature area, including the (un) common broomrape, lady's bedstraw, burnet saxifrage, and various hawkbit species. Often, several butterfly species can be spotted at any one time. This is the first year that we have allowed this area to grow, and we have needed to 'just observe' growth patterns. We thank the village for their support with this. We are now in a better position to make decisions and provide a more structured management practice, as well as inviting more participation from volunteers in the next seasons. Past Times

Baston In the Year 1937 (86 years ago); sourced from our *1985 Baston Newsletter*. Our village was much quieter than today. Few lorries came into the village to collect farm produce or make deliveries and gravel extraction down the Fen was in its infancy. Car traffic was minimal compared with today. A majority of villagers worked in farming, though tractors had taken over from horses on the eight+ major farms and were not really suitable on roads.

Main drainage did not exist and disposal was either through septic tanks. Many had overflows piped into the village dyke (*north beyond the cemetery and flowing eastwards*), or each house had outside earth 'privys', these being dug out once a year and spread over the land! Seemingly many cottages kept a pig, fed on house and garden waste and field gleanings, for food over the winter.

Baston had two grocers, one incorporating the Post Office with village postman for twice daily deliveries. Services included a butcher, baker, carpenter and wheelwright, builder, plumber, blacksmith, a cobbler, a haulage contractor, our own permanent village policeman, five public houses, one village school for ages 5-14 and the church with our own vicar and a choir; plus clubs to help the unfortunate. All were an integral part of our village of some 550 people. Self-sufficiency was the key. *Peter Rayner – village historian /contributor*
