Church Developments (... a loo!) - There has been a lot of discussion about new ways of doing church and new ways of covering ministry in our area, but in our lovely little church other changes are afoot. ### **Baston Organisations**

**BPFMC - FUNDING BIDS -** Following recent successful bids for funding from the SKDC UK Prosperity Fund, BPFMC has been able to replace the aged and obsolete seesaw. The old seesaw was beyond economical repair and spares are no longer available and its continued long-term safe usage could not be assured.

Additionally, follow a suggestion from a Villager, BPFMC successfully gained funding for a combined Parent & and Toddler Swing. This swing has replaced one of the Junior Swings on the main swing frame as it is not designed nor certified to be fixed to the Toddler swing frame. Funding was also obtained to replace the damaged and warped Fire Exits in the Barnand

**BASTON PARISH COUNCIL** - After a quiet summer, things are getting busy. Sadly, SKDC planning have not listened to any objections or taken into account the two planning rejections for 36 Main Street and have approved three more residences. While objection will be lodged, it looks like the developer has eventually got his way.

On the subject of planning applications, by the time you read this, the Thetford Farm/ Cemex application will be public knowledge, as discussed in a leaflet drop they have done in the last week or so. While there are pretty pictures of what the site will look like in 25 years time, there is no mention of the replace the old wooden front door. The Fire Exits can now be secured properly and easily opened and closed and the new front door allows light into the main entrance, which has greatly improved safety of movement within the building. These new doors should also help in reducing our heating bills.

**FROM OUR LOCAL COUNCILLORS** - Last month, the purchase of 12 new homes in Langtoft by SKDC for Ukrainian and Afghan refugees caused some controversy. Communication from SKDC could have been better. As District Councillors we did not know about this purchase before it was finalised but since then we have raised local concerns with SKDC on behalf of residents. There has now been a public meeting and all households in Langtoft have been written to. SKDC purchased these homes using central Government grant money which was ringfenced for the housing of Afghan and Ukrainian refugees who are already in this country legally. These houses will revert to social housing when the refugee visas expire so Langtoft should benefit from this increase in council housing in a few years' time. In the meantime, we would like to welcome these new families to the area.

At present the Council is switching to Choice Based Lettings so if you are on the Housing Register you should have been written to. We appreciate that this is a difficult time with the increase in the cost of living. # Past Times

Debilitating – a situation of feebleness, especially of health. Since early September that was my situation having been hit by a nasty piece of work – Shingles. Nope – not the type one sees on the seashore, or on gravel driveways (vide: stone in small irregular fragments, based on early 13c wordage in Old French, or possibly 'graw' from the Celtic), but the "inflammatory disease of the skin," late 14c., from Medieval Latin cingulus, a variant of Latin 'cingulum' girdle," from 'cingere' to gird". The medical use of the word in Medieval Latin is a translation of Greek, 'zōstēr', literally "girdle." The inflammation was so called because it often extends around the middle of the body, like a girdle. In my case on half my face! Very visible and messy with shooting pains up the side of the head, stiff neck, skin eruptions; moaning; grumbling – literally a bearded mess!

Now after the required seven-day pill procedures and good medical help, a simple painkiller will keep me stable for the next four weeks or so. Interestingly gardening helps, as does cooking – and sleeping - wonder why? Having caught shingles, could it have been avoided? Well maybe, but my chicken pox of some 80 years ago suggests not. Nor the fact that a vaccine is given only to 65 - 80 year olds. At 84 I am too late. So, if you wish to virtually avoid Shingles then get the vaccine.
