Vicar's View

Since I last wrote my sister and I have been on a walk, not just any walk, we went on a pilgrimage. We followed St Augustine's route from Rochester to Ramsgate. We had walked part of the route previously and wanted to finish the leg from Canterbury to Ramsgate.

I find there is something special about walking from bed to bed carrying everything on my back. The choices I need to make are few, life becomes simple. My sister and I are close, when we started the trip we had the drive down to Canterbury and we talked all the way there. We chatted a lot when we started walking, but as we began to get some miles under our belt we became quieter and eventually silent as we walked and thought.

We visited churches, the first being St Martin's in Canterbury, recognised as the oldest church building in Britain still in use as a church, and the oldest existing parish church in the English-speaking world. It is a special place and pausing to pray there felt a privilege.

Walking means that I notice things that I might miss when I am driving or even walking the dogs.

As we walk without talking we can hear the place we are walking through - the flow of water, the wind, birdsong. It may be tiring, but it is so satisfying and I feel any stress fading away as I focus on the silence, the creation and the rhythm of my steps which begin to feel prayerful.

This time was a gift, because my sister and I shared experiences, but also it allowed me to focus on prayer, to reflect on where I am as a child of God and also to prepare for all the busy-ness that comes with Advent and Christmas. I hope that each of you will have time to reflect on the importance of this special time of year and perhaps come along and join with friends and neighbours in some of our festive services.

FUTURE EVENTS IN CHURCH - As you walk round the village during December, look out for decorated windows. There will hopefully be a new one added each day to a life-sized Advent Calendar with the final one in church on Christmas Eve. FROM OUR DISTRICT COUNCILLORS - We are very aware of the concerns raised regarding the quarry application at Thetford Farm. It is not a 'done deal' and all applications are judged on individual merit. The matter will be decided upon by the elected politicians who form the Planning Committee at Lincolnshire County Council. They must work within the framework of the law and cannot block things without reason. However, as with many things there is an element of judgement involved. The District Council have no say over the final decision as they do not determine sand and gravel (mineral) applications. (SKDC have their own Planning Department and Committee that follow similar processes, but their remit is different and covers most property applications.) It is important that we all have faith in the democratic process and voice our concerns through the appropriate channels. Whatever the outcome of planning decisions it is important that it is fair, and people have had the opportunity to have their views heard. Baston is a wonderful village, and we hope that the strong sense of community is retained. On the entirely separate matter of bins, we appreciate that finding space for another bin may be challenging but this scheme is expected to increase recycling rates. BPFMC - MALICIOUS WATER WASTAGE Having spent the past six months carefully monitoring and controlling our utilities' usage and analysing monthly gas, electricity and water readings, BPFMC had managed to bring down the utilities bills to an acceptable level and arranged favourable tariffs going forward. However, sometime in the past 2-3 weeks, a malicious individual has accessed the water tap used to irrigate the cricket pitch and deliberately left it turned on fully; it was only discovered when the end-Oct water meter readings were taken. Consequently, our water consumption for October has been over 50x times that of each of the previous five months. This will result in an increase to our 6-monthly water bill of over £600 and effectively wipes out any residual funds we had available for next year's improvements. A Police Report has been submitted and CCTV is being analysed to see if the perpetrator can be identified.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS URGENTLY REQUIRED BPFMC urgently requires additional Committee members to help support and manage the daily and long-term requirements for the Barn, Children's play area, sports fields and tennis courts. The continued functioning of BPFMC relies solely on volunteers and without additional help, the future of our Village facilities cannot be guaranteed or assured. We all have an interest in seeing that the Barn and its surrounding fields continue to remain available for Baston families and their children to use and enjoy. To do this, I ask that if you are able to provide 2-3 hours of your time per month to assist with Committee business, it will lessen the burden on current Committee members and establish a robust management framework to assure the long-term availability of the Barn, Children's play area and sports fields. Please contact me if you are able to offer your support or find out what is involved in being a BPFMC Committee Member. Martin Wynne Chair

BASTON PARISH COUNCIL - You may have noticed the shiny new Baston notice board, erected by parish councillors, is a much sturdier notice board. The second phase of speed indicators is complete with two more posts in place on the south side of the village on the A15 and also at the top of Greatford Rd. Indicators will be installed as soon as possible. Interestingly, I have some statistics from the speed indicator opposite the hairdressers. During the month of Sept: • 28,866 vehicle movements were recorded • 94.52% (27,283 vehicles) travelled below 30mph • 4.54% (1,311) between 31mph and 35mph and remainder between 36mph and 65mph. The outstanding winner (sadly) is 11.03am Sunday 10th Sept recorded at a staggering 73mph. Someone will be knocking on your door to have a word. These speed indicators are doing the job and the two new ones can only help. The Cemex/Thetford quarry application has so far received 299 private objections and also objections from Baston PC, Deeping St. James PC, Greatford PC, Langtoft PC, Thurby PC and a strong objection from Lincs Wildlife Trust. Many thanks to everyone! Unfortunately, Welland & Deeping Drainage Board, South Kesteven Enviromental Health and Lincolnshire Police didn't feel the need to say very much at all! David Plant. Chair

Thursday 21st December: Jackie Oates & John Spiers - John Spiers is one of the leading melodeon players of his generation. She was a finalist in the BBC Radio 2 Young Folk Awards in 2003 and was a nominee for the Horizon Award in 2008, going on to win that Award in 2009. Immediately we were struck by the richness of the sound the three 'at the back' make. Past Times - A school in time

400 years ago Baston had a 'Dame' school in 1664, as Utting, Hammond MA, clerk, our vicar, admitted to exercise the office of Schoolmaster and instructor of boys in the parish church of Baston, 12 May 1666. Source: Church Register at Lincoln). The National Elementary Education Act of 1870 made provision to School Boards for children from ages 5 to 14. The Act required that every child should be taught in a reasonable building led by a qualified head teacher. Baston C of E Primary School was built by public subscription in 1863. Founded in School Lane (John James Rosby, master), it expanded in 1875 at a cost of £150, for 133 children.

Yet how many of the pupils taught at Baston Church of England Primary School between 1887 and 2006 have wondered about education being a joyous thing? Three registers recorded their 2979 names from that first entry in January 1887, including 42 evacuees from 'war-torn' Hull and the welcome expansion during the 1990s with the children of 'incomers'. Hopefully more pupils' names are available for the bi-centennial in 2087? Two handwritten logs from 1900 to 1964 recorded daily activities; attendance, illnesses, (school often closing for weeks from epidemics of measles, flu or chickenpox); up to 4 teachers; teaching practices, hard punishments (oh yes; the cane)!, health checks, exam successes, school inspections, frequent vicar and bishop visits, bleak weather, church parades. Pupil numbers reached 107 with daily attendances of 90 plus. School treats and milk introduced in the late 1930s at a halfpenny a bottle (one third of a pint, or 193 ml). School outings to Hunstanton and Skegness were well remembered. Pupils left school at 14 and worked on the farms, local factories. You were encouraged to write with the right hand. Ascension Day and Armistice day, were honoured. 13 March 1991, after lunch, the original School building in School Lane was severely damaged by fire - but lessons continued until the new School off Main Street, was opened on 19 April 1993 with over 80 pupils.
